William Balthazar Rose is appointed as the first artist-in-residence at the Bishop's Palace

Distinctive and idiosyncratic. Metamorphically eclectic. It's a statement that could summarise the Bishop's Palace 'experience' as a whole. Fittingly, it's also the sentence that art historian and critic Peter Dorley used to describe the work of artist William Balthazar Rose, who will take up his residency as the first ever artist-in-residence at the Bishop's Palace this spring, breathing the heart of Wells set to be an innovative, invigorating breath of fresh air for the town. Artist-in-residence programmes invite creative people to take time and space away from their usual habitat and are intended to allow inspiration to flow in a new environment, benefiting both

the artist, the residence and the local community alike. This new artistic venture represents a strong emotional resonance for Rose, who maintains an studio in Somerset and Tiverton but was a boarder at Wells Cathedral School in his youth, and recalls his time there as one of the happiest memories of his childhood.

Born into a family of artists in 1986, Rose was, from a very young age, fascinated by jewellery and costume design, architecture, stained glass and pottery, but chose painting with oil and fauna as his principle preoccupation in recent years.

"My aim as a painter is to broaden, elaborate and perfect to return to firm principles and expand upon the virtues of nature and proportion," he explains. Rose's body of work to date garners

inspiration from religious allegory to metaphysical landscapes and symbolic still life suffused with beauty and purpose. "Art is in part the expression of dynamic situations, situations that come from within," he says. "Art expresses the feelings of the spirit; one could say that it comes from an inner life, and derives quite directly from the necessity to make visible the needs of the soul."

An exhibition of Rose's work will take place in the Conference Room of the Palace from 28 March to 26 June. All the works displayed will be available for purchase, and visitors will be offered the opportunity to participate in a variety of sessions with the artist himself, including a painting workshop, talks and debates and the rare opportunity to watch him at work.
